1. CALL TO ORDER. Paul Cannon called the meeting to order at 1:34 p.m. in the conference room of the Abilene Life Sciences Accelerator, 1325 Pine Street, Abilene, Texas.

- 2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM THE JANUARY 10, 2012 BOARD MEETING. Mike Schweikhard moved to approve the minutes from the January 10, 2012 board meeting. The motion was seconded by Dani Ramsay and passed by unanimous consent.
- 3. SALES TAX REPORT FOR JANUARY 2012. Mike Rains noted that the sales tax rebate for economic development of \$941,066 for January represents November sales. This is 35.77% above November 2010 sales. Cumulative sales tax is up 26.81% above last year for the period October through January. Abilene ranked second in the state to Grand Prairie for sales tax increase. Mr. Rains stated retail sales and energy (utilities) attributed significantly to this increase.
- **4. OFFICER ELECTIONS: PRESIDENT, VICE PRESIDENT, SECRETARY/TREASURER.** This item was tabled at the January 10, 2012 meeting. A motion was made by Scott Senter to un-table this item for discussion and voting. Dani Ramsay seconded and the motion carried.

The current officers are: President – Paul Cannon, Vice President – Mike Schweikhard, and Secretary/Treasurer – Marelyn Shedd. Scott Senter moved to re-elect the same slate of officers for calendar year 2012. The motion was seconded by Dani Ramsay and passed by unanimous consent.

**5. EXECUTIVE SESSION.** I hereby announce we are going into Executive Session pursuant to Texas Government Code Sections 551.071, .072, and .087 to consult with our legal counsel, discuss real property transactions, and discuss economic development negotiations involving a business prospect, as set forth on the agenda. Any vote or action will be taken in open session.

President Paul Cannon announced the date is January 31, 2012, and the time is 1:40 p.m. Mr. Cannon later announced the date is still January 31, 2012, and the time is 2:25 p.m. No vote or action was taken in Executive Session.

6. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A CONTRACT AND FUNDS TO REBUILD THE PARKING LOT OF THE DCOA-OWNED BUILDING AT 4109 VINE ST. Staff requests the DCOA approve a contract with J.H. Strain & Sons and funding of up to \$160,580, which includes an 8.5% contingency of \$12,580, to rebuild the parking lot at 4109 Vine St. Also requested is additional funding of \$75,000 for the FY12 Property Maintenance budget for all DCOA-owned properties in order to handle the additional expense load of the Vine St. property.

Scott Senter moved to approve Resolution No. DCOA-2012.10 as presented. Dani Ramsay seconded and the motion carried.

7. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING FUNDING TO EXTEND THE FAST TRACK WELDING TRAINING PROGRAM. There was no discussion on this item.

A motion was made by Mike Schweikhard to approve Resolution No. DCOA-2012.09 authorizing funding up to \$417,438.00 to extend the Fast Track Welding training program six more sections (sections 10 through 15). Each 6-week section will allow for 14 trainees (total of 84) that will receive 192 hours of intensive welding training, preparing them for AWS Procedure Tests in the following: 1G, 2G, 3G and 6G positions. Each will also receive a 10-hour OSHA Safety Training and Certification and the Weld Expert Computerized Assessment. The motion was seconded by Dani Ramsay, and the motion carried.

**8. ADJOURNMENT.** The next meeting is February 14, 2012. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The sales tax rebate for February is \$4,703,517.25 which represents December sales. This is 20.12% above last year. The breakdown of the February rebate is \$3,527,637.94 to the General Fund and \$1,175,879.31 for economic development. Of this rebate, \$76,637 is from prior periods, audit payments, future payments, and unidentified payments. Based on this rebate, sales tax is 25.07% above last year for the period of October through February. I have requested the detail from the state.

The Comptroller audits the books of these businesses on a four year cycle to determine if sales tax was collected on all taxable sales. Audit collections represent the sales tax revenue from prior sales and submitted or refunded subsequent to the audit.

### THE COMPANY

Fehr Foods, Inc. (Fehr) began operations in 1992 with 27 employees after Steve Fehr purchased the assets of Magic Dream Cookies from the FDIC and Bankruptcy Court. In 1997 Fehr Baking Company, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary, was merged into Fehr and relocated to Abilene. Fehr manufactured cookies that were sold under the name of Lil' Dutch Maid and private labels.

A summary of all assistance provided by DCOA is as follows:

### February 1992 - Total assistance of \$300,000 - Retention of 27 existing FTE's

Real Estate - purchase of 5425 North 1<sup>st</sup> Street property - 50% loan participation with FNBA not to exceed \$185,000 and Equipment - purchase existing equipment of Magic Dream Cookie Company - 50% loan participation with FNBA not to exceed \$115,000.

## <u>July 1997 & January 1998</u> -Total assistance of \$2,101,000 -Creation of 85 and retention of 100 FTE's

Real Estate - 40% loan participation with FNBA not to exceed \$1,266,000; Equipment – reduced from 44% to 40% loan participation with FNBA not to exceed \$500,000; Relocation of equipment & fire suppression code compliance – in a maximum amount of \$90,000; Training assistance in a maximum amount of \$85,000; Architectural & Engineering – fees associated with the expansion up to \$160,000.

## May 2001 - New Agreement for \$650,000-Retention of 185 FTE's and capital improvements of \$1 million

New 40% participation with FNBA up to \$185,868 for R/E improvements; New 40% participation with FNBA up to \$314,132 for new equipment purchases; Relocation of utilities and A/E fees grant up to \$150,000 associated with the R/E improvements. Fehr expanded its existing facility by approximately 36,000 sq ft, made improvements to operations, and purchased new equipment for the packaging and mixing departments. Fehr did not project the creation of new jobs but did project increased skills levels, which resulted in higher wages for existing employees. Fehr agreed to retain 185 FTE's and make capital improvements of \$1 million.

# <u>August 2004 & July 2006</u> – New Agreement for \$3,000,000-Retention of 185 FTE's and creation of 65, and capital investment in facilities and equipment totaling \$9,000,000

New loan for \$3,000,000 at 0% interest to be earned through job creation at the rate of \$1,200 per year per job and an annual reduction of \$150,000 based on 12% of capital investment for a 7 year period. This expansion increased substantially in size and scope when implemented, whereby the total qualified capital investment increased to \$12,396,000 and the projected job growth to 326 FTE's.

Due to the increase in the costs of expansion and the increase in the number of jobs being created, DCOA assisted the company while not expending additional funds, by converting the three existing bank loans with outstanding balances totaling \$1,055,505 to an in-house earnable loan and combined it with the existing \$3,000,000 earnable loan. Also, the training funds not used from previous assistance packages of \$78,000 were reinstated. The resulting note for \$4,043,853 has been earned down and paid down each year by Fehr and now has an outstanding balance of \$600,633, which will be paid off

after the final job certification due under the existing agreement is submitted for the period ended June 30, 2012. The company's FTE total through June 2011 was 263.7.

November 2004 & November 2011 – Fehr began leasing Warehouse A containing 70,000 sq ft at 4109 Vine from the DCOA at \$1.50/sq ft/year in November 2004. The lease was extended in 2009 at \$1.67/sq ft/year. In 2011, when Affiliated Foods ceased operations in the remainder of the warehouses and office space on Vine St., Fehr began leasing the adjacent Warehouse B totaling 42,362 sq ft at \$1.67/sq ft/year.

On October 15, 2010, 100% of the stock of Fehr Holdings, LLC ("Fehr") was acquired along with its affiliates Fehr Foods, Inc., Oktex Baking, LP, and Oktex Baking GP, LLC. The Fehr Group is devoted to the production and merchandising of cookies, through its two production platforms, one located in Texas and the other in Oklahoma. The company mainly merchandises its products under the brands Lil' Dutch Maid, Sun Valley, and Tru-Blu that are sold in 43 states in the United States, in Mexico, and in Panama.

With this new acquisition, Grupo Nacional de Chocolates (now known as Grupo Nutresa) has strengthened its share of the regional biscuits business and has taken another step forward in making its long-term vision a reality. Also, due to the strategic location of that company's production and distribution centers, it will be able to produce Noel and Pozuelo brand cookies and much more efficiently attend to its target market in the United States, mainly the Hispanic population, in Mexico, and in the Caribbean. In addition, its proximity to wheat production centers, one of the main raw materials in the biscuit business, will mean significant savings and the development of that supply chain toward Colombia and Costa Rica.

Grupo Nutresa's purchase of Fehr made the Abilene operation the only one in the U.S. In 2011, Grupo Nutresa purchased an ice cream company in the Dominican Republic. These two acquisitions are strategically located in their target region – promising to provide increased market share, diversification and improvement of international sales, potential additional synergies for the Cookies and Ice Cream divisions, and potential improvement in the company's mix of products.

#### THE REQUEST

Grupo Nutresa's (holding company of Fehr Foods, Inc.) investment in Abilene since 2010 includes \$900,000 in equipment and quality improvements. Upcoming investments include \$4.1 million for Project El Dorado, which is the addition of a new cream cookie line that will be the most modern of any line in the company. It will increase the cream cookie capacity by 18 million pounds per year, a 30% increase and allow the company to develop different packaging alternatives. 39 new jobs will be created, there will be more flexibility from the production lines, they will make use of equipment that is not being used (i.e. oven, conveyors, cream machinery), and reduce occupational hazards by using cutting edge technology. Additional investments planned for 2012 include \$1 million for plant improvements and \$1 million for SAP implementation.

I recommend an assistance package of \$510,000 for the company's capital investment in Project El Dorado projected to be \$4.1 million plus \$1 million for additional plant improvements for total projected capital investment by the company of \$5.1 million. Since the job creation goals set in the existing agreement haven't been met, funding for the additional jobs related to Project El Dorado don't qualify for assistance; however, the company has taken steps to improve attendance and increase its wages. They currently pay hourly employees an average of 35% above minimum wage.

<u>Project El Dorado Capital Investment</u> – Up to \$410,000, or 10% of eligible capital costs of up to \$4,100,000, paid over 3 years at \$136,667 per year. Costs include mixing and cookie formation, oven

chamber overhaul, existing creamer machines overhaul, on-the-go (individual servings) and tray packaging solutions, cookie transport conveyors, and installation and adaptation of surroundings.

<u>Plant Improvements Capital Investment</u> – Up to \$100,000, or 10% of eligible capital costs of up to \$1 million, paid over 3 years at \$33,333 per year. Costs include upgrades to the plant, technology and equipment.

WHEREAS, with this new acquisition, Grupo Nacional de Chocolates (now known as Grupo Nutresa) has strengthened its share of the regional biscuits business, and due to the strategic location of its production and distribution centers, it will be able to produce Noel and Pozuelo brand cookies and much more efficiently attend to its target market in the United States, Mexico, and the Caribbean; and,

WHEREAS, Grupo Nutresa's (holding company of Fehr Foods, Inc.) investment in Abilene since 2010 includes \$900,000 in equipment and quality improvements, and upcoming investments include \$4.1 million for Project El Dorado, which is the addition of a new cream cookie line that will be the most modern of any line in the company and another \$1 million for plant improvements; and,

WHEREAS, staff requests the DCOA authorize an assistance package of \$510,000 for the company's capital investment in Project El Dorado projected to be \$4.1 million plus \$1 million for additional plant improvements for total projected capital investment by the Fehr of \$5.1 million.

### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF ABILENE, INC., ABILENE, TEXAS, THAT:

- PART 1. DCOA hereby authorizes funding of Five Hundred Ten Thousand and no/100's (\$510,000.00) for Fehr Foods, Inc. as an incentive for Fehr's capital investment totaling \$5.1 million in two projects with the assistance disbursed as follows:
  - 1) <u>Project El Dorado Capital Investment</u> Up to \$410,000, or 10% of eligible capital costs of up to \$4,100,000, paid over 3 years at \$136,667 per year. Costs include mixing and cookie formation, oven chamber overhaul, existing creamer machines overhaul, on-thego (individual servings) and tray packaging solutions, cookie transport conveyors, and installation and adaptation of surroundings.
  - 2) Plant Improvements Capital Investment Up to \$100,000, or 10% of eligible capital costs of up to \$1 million, paid over 3 years at \$33,333 per year. Costs include upgrades to the plant, technology and equipment.
- **PART 2.** Funding under this resolution is contingent upon execution of all necessary agreements.

### THE COMPANY

Broadwind Towers, formerly known as Tower Tech Systems, Inc. dba Texas TTSI, Inc. is based in Manitowoc, Wisconsin. Broadwind also owns Broadwind Services, formerly Energy Maintenance Services, a wind turbine blade repair and gearbox refurbishment/repair operation in the former Lockheed plant.

In 2008, the DCOA approved resolution DCOA-2008.14 authorizing an assistance package for Broadwind Towers in the total amount of \$3,816,250 in direct incentives for job creation of 150 and capital investment of \$20+ million for construction of a new manufacturing plant in the Five Points Business Park and equipment purchases. The package also includes indirect incentives totaling about \$911,250 for job training through the Fast Track Welding Training program, conveyance by the DCOA of 41.6 acres on Arnold Blvd. (north of PWP Industries), and rail service to the south boundary of the new construction site.

Broadwind Towers experienced higher than expected construction costs, due in large part to the topography of the land and their need for a large, compacted surface to store wind turbine towers. In late 2008, the DCOA approved an additional \$700,000 for capital investment incentive paid at 10% of the company's actual cost, which was around \$27.5 million. Construction was completed in early 2009, and two Fast Track Welding training sessions were held in 2008 and early 2009.

Below is a summary of the assistance package approved in 5/08 and amended in 10/08: Direct Incentives

- 1. <u>Job Creation Incentive</u> \$1,816,250 for the creation of 150 new jobs paid out over 5 years with 70% of the jobs expected to pay from \$40,000 to \$50,000/year. **Paid** three years through 10/11 totaling \$714,917.
- 2. <u>Capital Investment Incentive</u> \$2,700,000 paid in arrears to the company over 5 years at 10% of actual capital costs in an amount not to exceed \$540,000/year upon receipt by the DCOA of invoices evidencing the company's investment in construction and purchase of equipment. **Paid three years totaling \$1,620,024.**

#### Indirect Incentives

1. <u>Training Incentive</u> – \$75,000 to expand the Fast Track Welding Training program through Cisco College to meet the company's needs in the first year of operation. Students trained through the program could work for Broadwind Towers or any other company. Paid \$70,225 for two Fast Track Welding training sessions.

2. <u>Land and Rail Service Incentives</u> - \$236,250 to extend rail service to the south boundary of the new site and conveyance of 41.6 acres of land in the Five Points Business Park with an estimated value of \$600,000. Paid all \$236,250 for rail spur. Company has earned \$360,000 of the \$600,000 forgivable land note.

FTE counts reported by the company were 98 through 10/10 and 109 through 10/11. Due to the economic downturn, the company experienced layoffs and furloughs of employees. The company recently signed a contract with Caterpillar (CAT) to manufacture masts for heavy oilfield trucks used in this area. The company currently has 25 employees, but needs to add about 97 welders to fulfill the contract with CAT and to fulfill 2012 tower orders.

On November 8, 2011, the DCOA approved resolution DCOA-2012.02 authorizing the reallocation of \$20,500 from job creation incentive funds for Broadwind to be used instead for advanced welder training conducted by TSTC for 15 current and returning employees. The employees were trained in late 2011 and payment was made for Advanced Gas Metal Arc Welding and Advanced Flux Cored Welding.

To help fulfill the welder need of our local fabricators, the DCOA approved on January 31, 2012, resolution DCOA-2012.09 authorizing \$417,438 to extend the Fast Track Welding training program another 6 session to train up to 84 people with no prior welding experience. The program was publicly announced on February 9, 2012, and will begin in March. This training is conducted by Cisco College and is not advanced enough to fulfill Broadwind's needs.

### THE PROJECT

Broadwind will extend its advanced welding training to include 20 more employees and asks the DCOA to consider amending their agreement again to reallocate another \$38,400 as follows: 1) \$30,000 for advanced welding training for 20 students

- TSTC will allow Broadwind to use 5 Lincoln welders as training aids for the term of the agreement.
- These 20 new welders are in addition to what was added and trained in 2011.
- Broadwind will do all pre-employment screening of applicants. They will be hired as full time employees prior to start of training. Average wage for fabricators is \$17.00 per hour. Rate of pay for supervisors is \$24.00 per hour @ 56 hours for 8 employees.
- 2) \$8,400 for leadership training for the supervisory team.

Total cost for Broadwind \$78,752.00 (wages during training)

### FISCAL IMPACT

No new funds. Reallocation of \$38,400 from job creation incentive funds to advanced welder training for 20 additional employees.

### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends approval of resolution DCOA-2012.12 authorizing another reallocation of job creation incentive funds for Broadwind Towers of \$38,400 to be used instead for advanced welder training for 20 new employees in 2012.

WHEREAS, the package also includes indirect incentives totaling about \$911,250 for job training through the Fast Track Welding Training program, conveyance by the DCOA of 41.6 acres on Arnold Blvd. (north of PWP Industries), and rail service to the south boundary of the new construction site; and,

WHEREAS, in 2011, BT signed a contract with Caterpillar (CAT) to manufacture masts for heavy oilfield trucks used in this area and was in need of training money for 15 current and returning employees; and.

WHEREAS, on November 8, 2011, the DCOA approved resolution DCOA-2012.02 authorizing the reallocation of \$20,500 from job creation incentive funds for BT to be used instead for advanced welder training conducted by TSTC for 15 current and returning employees. The employees were trained in late 2011 and payment was made for Advanced Gas Metal Arc Welding and Advanced Flux Cored Welding; and,

WHEREAS, BT will extend its advanced welding training to include 20 new employees and asks the DCOA to consider amending its agreement again to reallocate another \$38,400 for advanced welding training.

# NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF ABILENE, INC., ABILENE, TEXAS, THAT:

- PART 1. DCOA authorizes a second reallocation of assistance originally approved for job creation for Broadwind Towers (formerly known as Tower Tech Systems) in 2008 in an amount up to Thirty-Eight Thousand Four Hundred and no/100's Dollars (\$38,400) to instead be used for advanced welder training for 20 new employees. All other assistance as outlined in the Agreement for Financial Assistance, Addendum A and Addendum B shall remain unchanged. The reallocated funding will be disbursed as follows:
  - 1) \$30,000 for advanced welding training for 20 students
