CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABILENE, TEXAS COUNCIL CHAMBERS, CITY HALL

The City Council of the City of Abilene, Texas met in Regular Session on October 12, 2017, at 4:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers, 555 Walnut St. Mayor Anthony Williams was present and presiding with Councilmen Shane Price, Bruce Kreitler, Weldon Hurt, Kyle McAlister, Steve Savage and Councilwoman Donna Albus. Also present were Assistant City Manager Mindy Patterson, City Attorney Stanley Smith, Assistant City Secretary Tiffni Hererra, and various members of the City staff.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Williams recessed the Council into Executive Session at 4:30 p.m. pursuant to the Open Meetings Act for the following:

7.1 James Childers, Assistant City Manager, presented this item to the city council on the Resolution supporting the application for a Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grant for relocation of the perimeter fence at Dyess Air Force Base.

Dyess Air Force Base is a crucial component of our nation's defense, hosting B-1 Bombers and C-130 aircraft. As the region's largest single employer, with an estimated economic impact of over \$430 million per year to the local area, it is also an integral part of the Abilene economy, as well as that of the entire state of Texas. The matching dollars for this grant are possible through \$82,200 in design and land acquisition costs from Dyess AFB along with Development Corporation of Abilene (DCOA) funds of up to \$200,000. The formal request for funding to the TMPC would be for \$281,679.88. The total funds flowing through the City would be approximately \$481,189.76, which includes TMPC and DCOA Funding. The City of Abilene is simply serving as a pass-through for the requested funds of \$481,189.76 and will not expend any funds as part of this process.

Council and Staff discussion included: 1) all land acquisition has been completed by Dyess AFB 2) Doug Peters of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce stated that if the grant was not approved, it would remain on the list of priorities; and 3) the project is contingent on this grant getting approval

Mayor Williams opened a public hearing, there being no one present, and desiring to be heard, the public hearing was closed.

Councilman Savage made the motion to approve the Resolution authorizing the City Manager to apply for the Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grant application for relocation of a perimeter fence at Dyess Air Force Base. Councilman Kreitler seconded the motion, motion carried.

7.2 Taurus Freeman, Interim Director of Planning and Development Services, briefed the council on the Ordinance for TC-2017-05, a request from G & P Rentals, agent Jim Hatchett Jr., to abandon all of a 20' wide, east-west alley through Block 9, Oakwood Addition, City of Abilene, and Taylor County, Texas, located at 2960 North 1st Street. In 1958, a multi-tenant shopping center building was built over the alley and utilities. The building was constructed before the site planning process was required by the City of Abilene. The existing 'platted' alley was over-looked during the time of the issuance of a building permit and construction. During the process of preparing the building for sale, the applicant(s) discovered the existence of the alley and utilities; therefore, the reason for the thoroughfare closure request. The applicant has been working with the different utility providers to remedy the situation with the utility lines that run under the existing building. This includes, but not limited to, relocating, privatizing or removing the utility lines to the satisfaction of the individual utility providers.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval

BOARD OR COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

The Development Review Committee recommends approval of the request to abandon approximately 341 feet of an existing alley that runs east to west, between N. Mockingbird Lane and Burger Street, with the following conditions:

- 1. The applicant must replat within 12 months
- 2. The applicant is responsible for providing easements for and/or relocating any existing utilities

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of this request by a vote of six with none in opposition.

Council and Staff discussion included: 1) no utility lines run under the building 2) replatting and fees involved; property title is clouded because of this 3) if the site is developed in the future they would have to go through site plan review; staff will notify the applicant of those requirements

Mayor Williams opened the public hearing and the Council heard from the following citizens:

1. Doug Offermann - will there be a financial obligation on the City

Councilman Kreitler made the motion to approve the Ordinance for **TC-2017-05**, a request from G & P Rentals, agent Jim Hatchett Jr., to abandon all of a 20' wide, east-west alley through Block 9, Oakwood Addition, City of Abilene, and Taylor County, Texas, located at 2960 North 1st Street. 


7.3 James Childers, Assistant City Manager briefed the city council on an Ordinance that would establish a Street Maintenance Fee.

The summer of 2017 saw a robust public dialogue on the merits of implementing a Street Maintenance Fee (SMF) to raise funds to maintain Abilene's road infrastructure. Feedback from community stakeholders was used to construct a proposal that generated \$10.3 million in revenue annually and was presented to the City Council at the August 10, 2017 Council Meeting. The proposed \$10.3 Million plus in revenue was realized through a combination of residential revenue, commercial revenue, and Type A Economic Development funds and did not propose the use of any existing revenue. A motion to move the presented SMF model to a November ballot ultimately failed. A general observation from both the Council and public was that generating \$10.3 Million in new revenue was "too much, too soon" for many Abilenians. The City Council instructed staff to explore other options to lower the fees.

The charts below show the revenue distribution of the model initially presented to City Council on June 20, 2017 with the model presented on September 26, 2017 Council Meeting.



This model totaled \$10,993,000, with a \$2.5 Million Type A tax, residential rates at \$9 for single and multi-family, and commercial tier rates that range from \$30 to \$300



This model is from FY24 totals \$10,259,636, with residential rates of \$8.75 residential, \$8 for multi-family, \$1.75 for seniors, commercial tier rates that range from \$45 to \$95. This model continues annual revenue from colleges at \$59,000, GFs of \$1,473,500, use of tax rate capacity of \$1,602,300. There would not be any Type A funding at this point in the program.

Childers explained that what is presented for Council consideration this meeting takes a phased approach where revenues generated from the fees on residential and commercial users are supplemented with Type A funds from the Development Corporation of Abilene (DCOA), City operational savings, and repurposing of existing tax revenue. During fiscal years 2018 and 2019, the rates charged to residential and college customers are 36% less that what was presented to the Council on August 10, 2017. Commercial customers on six tiers will see a rate savings of approximately 50% across the board during these first two years. In fiscal years 2020 through 2024, the rates will increase in both residential and commercial categories, but these rates will be 25% lower in both categories compared to what was presented on August 10, 2017.

The table below shows the financial impact over the next seven fiscal years:

*2018 SMF Rev numbers assume the straight adoption of the SMF and billing start date of 4/1/18 for residential and commercial customers and 7/1/18 billing start date for colleges and multifamily

**Residential rates (residential and multifamily) increase by \$2 per month and commercial rates increase \$20 per month in each tier starting in FY 2020

Staff recommends approval.

Council and Staff discussion included: 1) 30 different public meetings and this evening meeting have been held to allow public input 2) how the funds would be used, street repair scheduling 3) the plan has changed, obligation to offer more public education 4) because of the impact on citizens, this needs to be put on an election ballot 5) direct staff to begin the process of creating a citizen's advisory board 6) bonds for street repairs 7) council members are elected to make hard decisions that are not always put on an election ballot 8) defining whether this is a tax or a fee; the city attorney stated that this is a user fee being that a tax is authorized by the tax code on actual property, etc., a fee is for use of a product or facility, provided to the citizens and has to be dedicated to that use
