THE STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS

The Abilene Public Library (APL) management team and two members of the Library Advisory Board gathered on September 15, 2023, for strategic discussions facilitated by Eddy Smith of the Abilene Library Consortium.

The process included the team's Working Genius assessment to connect and constructively frame the strategic discussions. The team then reviewed the City of Abilene's purpose, mission, vision, core values, and strategic priorities of the City Council. The team reviewed library goals and objectives from FY2023, determining which were to continue and identifying new objectives.

The team reviewed the Library's mission statement and worked on potential language for revisions to the mission, finalizing it in subsequent drafts to: "We inspire and connect our community today and into the future." This concise and impactful statement communicates the library's commitment to inspiring individuals and fostering connections within the community, both presently and for generations to come.

The day ended with vision conversations about the future of library services in Abilene as the library prepares for relocation into Abilene Heritage Square in several years.

In the intervening months since the session, the APL Management Team has added scope to the outlined goals, ensured alignment with City and Council priorities, and identified measurable objectives for tracking progress, detailed in the following pages.

COMMUNITY PROFILE

About the City

The City of Abilene, Texas is located approximately 180 miles west of the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex, near the geographic center of the state. Conveniently connected east-west by Interstate Highway 20, and north-south by U.S. highways 83, 84, and 277. Abilene is the center of a 22-county area commonly referred to as the Big Country.

Abilene: Past, Present & Future

In the 1800s, nomadic Native Americans, U.S. soldiers, buffalo hunters, and ranchers roamed what is now the Abilene landscape. By the time the 1870s arrived, the Native Americans had been driven out and their lands had been overrun by hungry cattle and ambitious cowboys. However, the introduction of the railroad system started a great industry progression, calling Abilene the Future Great City of West Texas. Abilene was established in March 1881 and shortly thereafter in January of 1883, local residents voted to incorporate. That fall, Abilene became the county seat of Taylor County, and after only seven years, the city grew to 3,194 people.

Today, more than 120,000 friendly people call Abilene home, and the city represents an eclectic mix of Old West heritage, contemporary culture, and traditional values. As a Top Texas Destination, there is something for everyone in Abilene. For instance, visitors can feed giraffes at the Abilene Zoo or relive rugged Western lore through cutting-edge technology at Frontier Texas! Art enthusiasts can find inspiration at various museums and cultural events held in Downtown Abilene such as ArtWalk, City Sidewalks, and the annual Children's Arts and Literacy Festival. Abilene is home to the largest collection of public storybook sculptures of its kind in America, and in 2016, the 84th Legislature of the State of Texas designated Abilene as the official Storybook Capital of Texas for its efforts to celebrate literary works for children. Since then, the Storybook Capital's draw has expanded across America. To recognize the growing appeal of the Storybook Capital, the Abilene Cultural Affair Council, in partnership with the Abilene Convention and Visitors Bureau, decided in 2018 to trademark the term "Storybook Capital of America" with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office.

Abilene is a centerpiece for employment, retail, and medical services in West Texas. While the city continues to expand, both the manufacturing and wind energy industries have likewise increased to meet growing demand and opportunities. Interstate and state highways, Union Pacific Railroad cargo service, and air travel via Abilene Regional Airport provide citizens and industry easy access to transportation services. Charter air and ground travel services are available as well. For those pursuing higher education, students may choose between three universities, a college, a technical college, a pharmacy school, and schools of nursing. The city boasts attractive and affordable housing, excellent schools, a revitalized historic downtown, an assortment of tourist attractions, recreational possibilities, top-notch medical facilities, a regional industrial hub, Dyess Air Force Base, and a philanthropic community.

City Governance

The City of Abilene is a municipal corporation incorporated under Article XI, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas (Home Rule Amendment). The City operates under a Council-Manager form of government and provides such services as are authorized by its charter to advance the welfare, health, morals, comfort, safety, and convenience of the City and its citizens.

The City Council is the legislative and policy-making body of the City of Abilene. Six City Councilors represent each of the six places in the City (three north of South 1st Street and three south of South 1st) but are elected and serve at large representing all citizens of Abilene. Councilors serve staggered three-year terms with two members up for reelection each year. The Mayor is also elected at-large and also serves a three-year term.

The Council enacts legislation, adopts the budget, sets tax rates, determines policies, and approves the Mayor's appointment of the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney, Municipal Court Judge, and all Boards and Commission members.

- Above is the new mission statement for the Abilene Public Library, crafted from discussions during the strategic planning session in September 2023.
- Abilene has operated a lending library since 1899.
- The Abilene Public Library Advisory Board is a City board with members appointed by the Mayor and approved by the Abilene City Council. The APL Advisory Board consists of seven members. APL Advisory Board terms are for three years, with the option to apply for renewal for a second term.
- APL has a staff of 38 FTE (31 full-time and 14 part-time employees).
- The Abilene Public Library operates three facilities in Abilene. The Main Library, located at 202 Cedar Street, will be relocated to the Abilene Heritage Square campus, with an anticipated opening date in late 2025. The Library will have approximately 23,000 square feet of additional space in the new building.

Also included in this planning session, is the review of Council's priorities and accomplishments for the prior year and the establishment of Council's priorities for the upcoming year. This discussion provides the framework for departments to review and adjust their priorities and objectives to align with City Council and provides the foundation for building the budget.

Departments continuously monitor and report on their priorities, objectives, and measures throughout the year. This is done through shared dashboards as well as meetings with City administration.
